MINUTES OF THE 98TH ANNUAL GENERAL (BUSINESS) MEETING

Minutes of the 98th Annual General (Business) Meeting held on October 30, 2024 at 1700 hrs at “Engineers Bhawan”, 2, Bahadurshah Zafar Marg, New Delhi-110002.

ITEM 0 Welcome by the Chairman and Opening Remarks

Prof S K Singh, Chairman, IEI-DSC extended a warm welcome to the members present in the meeting and thanked them for their support, guidance and cooperation extended during the year. The Chairman briefed member about the activities focused during last year. He mentioned that the Centre has been striding ahead in both technical activities and financial position during last one year. DSC has complied to all statutory requirements including implementation of GST. Reconnect with corporate members have been successfully done through Bulk SMS and E-mails being sent regularly. Participation of esteemed members have tremendously increased which is very encouraging. The changed scenario is quite evident by attendance in the today’s meeting.

Chairman apprised that India is leading the renewable energy revolution, with a strategic emphasis on solar power to meet its growing electricity needs. The 14th National Electricity Plan (NEP14), introduced in May 2023, aims to double the country's electricity generation capacity by 2032, with solar energy poised to play a pivotal role. The government is actively promoting the transition to solar power as a key strategy for addressing environmental concerns and meeting the country’s growing energy needs. This proactive approach reflects India’s dedication to reducing its carbon footprint and embracing cleaner, more environmentally friendly alternatives to conventional energy sources. We are very proud to informed you all that in the last months of our tenure we installed a 50 KVA Solar Plant in our institution. We spent approximately Rs. 33 lakhs for this project. Alien Energy Pvt Ltd which is renowned firm in this sector was awarded to do this project.

He also informed the house that the condition of the Committee Room was also very bad. In recent days we have renovated it. In this work also we have spent approximately Rs. 19 lakhs. M/s C K Associate was awarded to do this work. Now the work of this committee room has not been completed. I have requested to the new office bearer of Delhi State Centre-IEI to complete over our unfinished work.

The house apprised the effort of Chairman and Honorary Secretary.


his address he stated that World Water Day 2025 World Water Day is observed on 22nd March every year by The United Nations.

Basis for Opinion
